
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Welcome to St. Paul's

in Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.





Dive deeper!

Philippians 4:6-7 Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and

supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God; and the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus.

As the culture war continues to escalate all over the world, we as believers should be filled with peace in the midst of intense conflicts. So how can we be filled with peace in the midst of such adversity? How is that possible, one may wonder? One method of finding your "shalom" is a lesson found in nature.

When a storm swarms across the ocean surface, the fish know where the water is still -- deep down under. While, on the surface, the winds and the waves rage, fathoms below lies water completely at peace. Perhaps we should learn something from fish.

In a shallow relationship with God, we will find ourselves being tossed to and fro by stormy waves of circumstance. James describes such a person as "double-minded" and unstable. In his trials, he cannot exercise faith because he has-

n't gone deep with the Lord.

However, when we seek that deeper relationship with Him, we can enter another perspective on what's happening at the surface. Seeking and abiding in the depths of Yeshua,

our Sar Shalom (Prince of Peace) will bring a peace that passes understanding, even in the midst of great storms.

The double-minded man has not yet sought or



found this place - since not everyone is willing to spend the time or effort for a deep relationship, however, it is available for all who truly desire and take the time for it.

Are you distressed or worried? It's time to press in... seek that deeper relationship with Yeshua and let Him lead you to the still water. He so wants to fill you with a "shalom" that passes all understanding!


by noon on 10th March 2021. These will be collated to support the work of the Vacancy in See Committee.

At this meeting the Committee will elect, from its membership, six individuals to represent the diocese on the Crown Nominations Committee (CNC). Those six individuals will join national representatives on the CNC and that group will take forward the process for discerning who should be the next Bishop of Portsmouth.

Friends of Newport & Carisbrooke Cemeteries



According to the website, the aim of the volunteers of the Friends of Newport & Carisbrooke Cemeteries is "to clear overgrowth from grave markers and document them together with unmarked burials at Cemeteries in the modern civil parish of Newport, Isle of Wight - the cemeteries covered are Newport, St Paul's (old and current) and Carisbrooke (Mount Joy) Cemeteries (plus the old churchyards at St Mary's Carisbrooke and St Paul's church Barton)".

It's an interesting website and of particular interest to people researching their ancestry or looking at local history. As you will see both churchyards relating to St. Paul's are included.

The group produce a newsletter every several months (copies available on their website) which highlights work undertaken and other items of historical interest. February's newsletter contained an interesting article relating to St. Paul's:

St. Paul's Churchyard ('a bit off topic')

Without much to report on the cemeteries, it might be interesting to mention a couple of round 'tablets' set into the inside of the boundary wall of St. Paul's church, by the side of the south-east gate.

The Isle of Wight Observer, 1 October 1853 records under Newport General News:

"A very handsome monument (designed by Mr. W. Dashwood, of this town executed by Mr. E. Joyce, of Ryde, and paid for by the whole of the ship's crew, from the Commanding Officer to the common seaman) has been erected at St. Paul's Church, in memory of three of the crew of the "Cockatrice" schooner, who were drowned by the capsizing of a boat off the coast of California.

On one side of the tablet is engraved:

'Sacred to the memory of George Dowden, aged 29 years, Joseph Shrubsell, aged 25 years, able seaman, and Gabriel Victoria, 48 years, pilot of Mazathan, who were unfortunately drowned by the capsizing of a boat off Talava Point, Gulf of California, April 5th, 1852.'



And on the other side:

'This Tablet is erected by the Commanding Officer and ship's company of Her Majesty's schooner, 'Cockatrice,' to mark


the esteem and respect they held their unfortunate shipmates.'

The first named was a native of the immediate neighbourhood of the above church, which was no doubt the reason it was placed there."

Today, the monument has been mounted into the wall, probably when the wall was rebuilt in the 1960's as part of road-widening, showing just the first inscription, the other plaque, apparently produced at another time, shows an illustration of three figures on rocks and a ship.

To be honest, I have never really particularly noticed what we have set into our wall, I wonder how many times many of us have passed this, so close to the gate, and never even noticed!

Lent Bible Study Notes - Week 3 INTRO

In this session we are looking at a truly life-changing encounter which took place on that Easter Sunday evening, when Jesus first appeared to His disciples as a group. The two key points we'll be looking at are:

- 1. When we encounter Jesus, He changes us
- 2. Then, **He sends us out** to change the world around us

BRING YOUR BIBLES

Read aloud **John 20:19–23**, encouraging everyone to follow along in their own Bibles. The more translations the better as each may highlight something different.

Now allow the whole group the opportunity to share what stood out anew to them and why.

QUESTIONS

- 1. [If your church are running the 40 Days with Jesus sermons What particularly impacted you from Sunday's message?
- 2. [If you are using the small group videos instead] What particularly impacted you from this week's message?
- 3. How would you describe the mood of the disciples at the beginning of this passage? Given the evidence we have looked at over the last two weeks, are you surprised that they are living 'in fear'?
- 4. How does Jesus convince His disciples that it really is Him? What is the significance of Jesus showing them His 'hands and side' and what impact does it have on them?

- 5. Like the disciples, the resurrection of Jesus offers us new hope – hope for our future, hope beyond the grave, hope into eternity. How does that hope impact our lives now?
- 6. What purpose does Jesus give to His disciples in verse 21? How does He equip the disciples to fulfill this purpose? Note for the leader: New Power (v22), New Authority (v23)
- 7. Is this purpose still relevant in our lives today?
- 8. What do you make of Jesus breathing on the disciples in order for them to receive the Holy Spirit? Looking back at Genesis 2:7, what are the similarities and differences between these two accounts?
- 9. How would you share your sense of being a new creation with someone who doesn't yet know Christ?

SHARE YOUR STORY

You can discuss the following questions together as one group or, if individuals prefer, you could split into groups of twos or threes.

- 10. How can we know Jesus' peace even when we can't physically see Him? Are you able to share a time when you recently experienced His joy or peace in your life?
- 11. Where do you sense God has sent you or is going to send you to live out His Great Commission? On a scale of one to ten, how passionate are you for this aspect of mission?
- 12. Share together how either you have led someone to find forgiveness through encountering Christ, or how someone led you to first find forgiveness in His name.

PRAY TOGETHER

Take the time to invite the Holy Spirit into your group. Perhaps begin with prayers of worship and thanksgiving, then you may choose to follow these suggestions for specific prayer:

You could pray:

- that as you all go into your daily lives and have your daily devotions, you'll expect new encounters with Jesus
- for the Holy Spirit to fill you and to keep on filling you with His peace, hope and joy
- for a fresh passion for God's purposes in your life
- that every person in the group would realise their great power and authority, as given from God, and use it for His glory.
